### **BC ELKS ASSOCIATION EXECUTIVE SUMMARY 2020-2021**

Welcome to our 92<sup>nd</sup> Conference. On behalf of the BC Elks Association I would like to thank Kamloops Elks No. 44, because of Covid-19 we were unable to hold our Conference in 2020 and Kamloops Elks No. 44 continued on to have our 2021 Conference.

Membership was not easy to deal with, as Covid-19 slowed it down, hopefully, we can move forward and attract new members this coming year.

#### 2021 National Convention

Due to the pandemic, the 2021 Elks of Canada National Convention was held in July virtually via Zoom. The Grand Executive met in Regina and attended the meeting virtually as a group. There was a total of 83 members in attendance, 7 of which were from BC. Some of the highlights were a resolution to hold the National Convention virtually every second year. After tremendous discussion this was tabled until the 2022 National Convention (being hosted by the Sherwood Park Elks #481).

The Strategic Planning Committee put forward a resolution to reduce the current positions on the Grand Executive. The resolution removes the positions of Immediate Past Grand Exalted Ruler and the Grand Inner Guard. This resolution passed unanimously. The BC Elks Youth Groups Program was initiated in June 2018 with the objective of creating a program framework and guidelines for Elks Lodges throughout British Columbia to establish and support Elks Youth Groups for youth aged 14 to 18.

By mid November 2018 the first 'Junior Elks Club' was formed at Kwalikum Secondary School in Qualicum Beach under the guidance of Sister Lynn Small who is the pilot program advisor from Parksville-Qualicum Elks Lodge No. 589. However, over the past year and a half the Covid-19 pandemic has made it impossible for any of their planned activities to take place. In any event, members of the group have not given-up and hope to resume in the fall of 2021.

The following benefits have been identified for youth who become involved in the program.

- Leadership skills development through the planning, organization and implementation of their own Youth Group activities and community services, while being supported by their local Elks Lodge.
- Focused youth and community-oriented objectives leading to a real sense of achievement.
- Participation in organized charitable causes and fulfillment of youth group or community fundraising goals.
- Fun and companionship through youth group activities.
- Establishment of a regularly scheduled meeting place, either at school or somewhere else in the community.
- Making a difference for students, their friends, school and community.
- Identification of opportunities and participation in volunteer services to achieve graduation required volunteer hours for grade 11 and 12 students.
- Availability of youth group retreats at any one of the three BC Elks Children's Camps.

The Elks Recreation Children's Camp Society of British Columbia provides the following three camps, free of charge, to Elks Youth Groups or any other organized youth group (i.e. cadets, scouts, girl guides, sports

teams, school bands, church affiliated youth organizations, etc.) whose members are 18 years of age or under. The three Elks Children's Camps in British Columbia are:

Camp Elkcanoe near Salmon Arm with 64 beds

Camp Elkgrove in Aldergrove Regional Park with 48 beds

Camp Elkhaven on Denman Island with 54 beds

**FINANCE COMMITTEE REPORT – CHAIRMAN, PETER MEIDEMA**

The fiscal year ended March 31, 2021 of the BC Elks Association showed a slight improvement in revenues over budget due to our investments and slightly higher than the previous year, due to improvement in collection of membership dues. Expenses, totaling \$19,188.05, came in under budget by \$2,980.70 and lower than prior by \$23,097.04, resulting in an operating profit of \$21,372.13, compared to last year's operating loss of \$2,859.73 and a budgeted profit of \$15,971.25. Profit for the year after amortization was \$19,631.13, higher than budget by \$5,399.88, and higher than previous year by \$24,366.86. Expenses were impacted by the effects of the current pandemic situation, resulting in decreases in Executive committee costs, Director's travel expenses, postage, office supplies, service contracts, wages and benefits and property taxes, legal fees, conference costs and telephone. Only postage and utilities were slightly higher.

Fr the month of April 2021, BC Elks Association showed an operating profit of \$478.33, and profit for the month after amortization was \$340.83, compared to budget of \$1,176.87, and prior year profit of \$860.92.

The Elks Recreation Children's Camp Society had a reasonably good year of fundraising by our contracted professional fundraisers the current pandemic, generating \$139,075.38, higher than budget, but lower than the previous year by \$22,348.27. Total operating revenues for the year was \$158,277.73, \$83,900.90 lower than previous year, and \$281.17 over budget for the year ended march 31, 2021, mainly due to Lodge donations of \$14,425.00, \$18,575.00 under budget and \$40,000.95 lower than last year.

As the necessary repairs at the camps had been completed in prior years, expenses to the year totaled \$173,890.09, \$72,400.09 lower than last year, and \$9,323.76 under budget, resulting in an operating loss of \$15,612.36 for the year, compared to an operating loss of \$4,021.55 last year, and a budgeted operating loss of \$25,217.29 for the year. After amortization and the other income items, the loss for the year was \$78,470.44, compared to a loss of \$68,029.11 the previous year, and a budgeted loss of \$88,066.29.

For the month of April 2021, the Camp Society shows a loss of \$10,615.48 before amortization and other income, and a total loss of \$15,681.54 after amortization and other income, compared to a budgeted loss of \$18,733.71 for the month, and a loss of \$16,692.70 in April 2020.

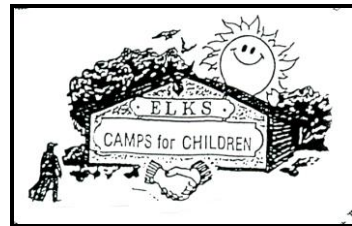

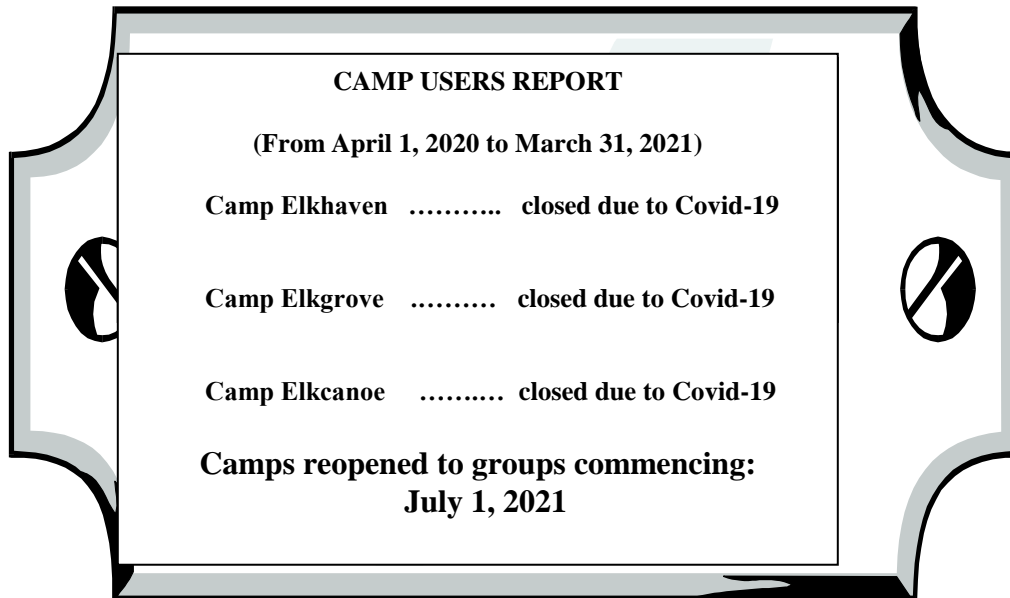

## **BOARD OF DIRECTORS REPORT 2020-2021**

### Children’s Camps Covid-19 Safety

Over the past year and a half the Elks Recreation Children’s Camp Society of British Columbia, its Board of Directors, office staff, Camp Coordinators and Camp Caretakers, have taken our response to the Covid–19 pandemic very seriously. In doing so, an initial Safety Protocol dated July 20, 2020 was prepared which stated the ways we were aiming to ensure the health and safety of our Camp users, our dedicated Camp Caretakers and that of our communities. We made every effort to meet or exceed the requirements and guidelines established by British Columbia public health and safety authorities, including the May 27, 2020 Order of the Provincial Health Officer which prohibited overnight camps for children and youth under the age of 19. The Safety Protocol was intended to facilitate any interest there might have been for day camps.

As of June 29, 2021 an updated Safety Plan was put in place and submitted to the respective three Health Authorities for our Children’s Camp facilities in compliance with the June 7, 2021 Order Of The Provincial Health Officer (PHO), Dr. Bonnie Henry, Overnight Camps For Children Or Youth under the age of 19 years. As required by the PHO Order, our document was prepared to align with the BC Camps Association COVID-19 Guidelines found at <http://bccamping.org/Resources-For-Camps> with comprehensive guidelines found under:

2021 BCCA COVID-19 HEALTH & SAFETY GUIDELINES – OVERNIGHT CAMPS, and  
2021 BCCA COVID-19 HEALTH & SAFETY GUIDELINES – DAY CAMPS & FAMILY CAMPS

After a store went through a few years ago, a friend of Elkhaven took the downed trees to his mill and returned boards for the garage doors and planks for our firepit. As the equipment gets older there will always be work to keep our only property improving. In the new future the Caretaker's old trailer will need some significant upgrading.
